Tips Concerning Resumes & Head Shots and

Resume Samples

Resume Basics:

- ✓ Your resume is a one page list of your significant theatrical experience (stage, roles, training, education) and your physical description and contact information.
- ✓ Resumes should be printed on white paper. You can either attach your photo (with staple/paper clip) or you can insert your photo into your resume electronically.
- ✓ Typically, a standard 8" x 11" paper will work best.

Resume Content:

- ✓ List your name first. Feel free to add a descriptive term such as "actor" or "actor-singer-dancer" immediately after your name.
- ✓ Beneath your name, list any professional affiliations you have. (such as Equity, AFTRA, etc.)
- ✓ Give your physical description (height, weight, hair, eye color and vocal range.)
- ✓ List your full contact information including your cell phone and email information.
- ✓ The Experience section should take up most of the space on your resume. You
 may want to divide your experience into categories (dance, film, etc.)
- ✓ Usually in the Experience section you will include the name of the play, role you placed, name and location of the theatre, director's name.
- ✓ Training and Education would come next. List where you have studied including with whom you have studied and for how long.
- ✓ Special talents can be listed next. Skills such as juggling, pantomime, stage combat, dialects, etc.
- ✓ Finally, you can list any theatrical awards and honors.

Make sure you have someone in the industry or Career Center review your resume before submitting it. See the samples included in this tutorial for some real examples!

Headshot Basics:

For actors, the headshot is comparable to a business card. It will help directors and casting agents remember you.

- ✓ The picture should be an 8" X 10" photo, shot against a neutral background that compliments your appearance, with careful lighting.
- ✓ Make sure that the picture looks like you so the casting director will be able to put you and your photo together during post-audition sessions.
- ✓ The photo should be without white space margins (or borderless).
- ✓ If you work with an experienced theatrical photographer ask him/her if color or black or white would be best. Until recently, black and white were the norm but now in some areas; Los Angeles, for example, color is proving to be the "right" choice.
- ✓ Avoid the "high school/yearbook" look with your picture. You want your picture to be professional and theatrical.
- ✓ There are no specified rules about what you wear but you may want to choose a variety of styles that speak about your personality and image. Avoid clothing with lots of patterns and frills which can distract and avoid wearing too much jewelry. Hand props can be more distracting than helpful.
- ✓ Virtually every headshot shows the actor looking directly into the camera. Look into the human behind the camera so that you project a human and engaged picture.
