 ${f T}$ he dates for this year's Great Lakes Odonata Meeting (GLOM) are Friday, July 9th through Sunday July 11th and it will take place in central Ohio. The meeting will include the annual business meeting of the Ohio Odonata Society on Friday evening at the Cedar Ridge Lodge at Battelle-Darby Metro Park. The brief and informal OOS business meeting will be sandwiched between a cook-out meal of Corn on the cob, Grilled Chicken Kabobs with fixins, & likely french fries for all registered attendees and a series of presentations by any participant (OOS member or not) attending the GLOM. HIGHLIGHTS, ATTRACTIONS AND EVENTS

The highlight and major attraction of this meeting will be collecting and photography along Big and Little Darby Creeks. The Nature Conservancy listed these streams as one of the "Last Great Places" in the United States. The Darby Creeks are state and federal Scenic Rivers and the Ohio EPA says that "the watershed is known to provide habitat for several state and federally listed endangered species. The streams in the watershed are home to unique and diverse biological communities of fish, freshwater mussels and the associated benthic invertebrate fauna." Ophiogomphus rupinsulensis (Rusty Snaketails) and a variety of other interesting clubtails cruise the river habitat, as well as up to four species of River Cruisers (Macromia spp) and the fascinating Nasiaeschna pentacantha (Cyrano Darner). Nearby ponds are home for Anax longipes (Comet Darner) and other interesting pond species. Much of the two rivers are enclosed within several of the Columbus Metro Parks, and the Park District is a co-sponsor of the event. Many of the field trips will take place on Metro Park properties. Other field trip possibilities being explored are the nearby Olentangy River (also a State Scenic River), and further afield to Clear Creek at the edge of the Hocking Hills and a photo-only trip to Cedar Bog Nature Preserve. A Saturday evening outing to search for Neurocordulia species (Shadow Dragons) is also in the works. Details will be updated as they become available on the OOS web page (http://www.marietta.edu/~odonata/index.html). Join us for one or all three days!

THREE NEW BROWN COUNTY ODONATA RECORDS FROM 2009 !

The first author (Steve) is working on the Black Bugs (Hemiptera; Thyreocoridae) of Ohio. Wanting to go look for southern Ohio specimens, he picked a weekend to go to Brown County Ohio. Another reason for choosing Brown county is that it is one

of the counties with relatively few Odonate species recorded (something about 2 birds with one stone?). Sylvia wanted to "help". All of us with kids understand that when their child wants to "help" it is hard to say no. O.K. fine, we loaded some nets and took off on a sunny day for Brown County. We were indeed successful in finding one Thyreocoridae species in 2 southern Ohio counties and also spent some time observing, collecting odonates. We encountered a dozen species in Brown County, for 8 of the species we captured voucher specimens. Three of these 8 were found to be new county records (see list below). In the past year, 11 new Brown county odonata records have been reported as 8 species collected in the early summer of 2008 were recently reported as new to the Brown County list (Harp et al., 2009).

Species list from 16-August-2009.

Indian Creek Wildlife Area, ¹/₂ mi E of Fayetteville on U.S. Hwy 50, corner of Murray Corner Road and Campbell Road, Indian Creek Marsh - near archery range.

- Zygoptera = Enallagma aspersum * (Hagen, 1861), (Azure bluet) 1 male (Figure 1); Ischnura verticalis (Say, 1839) (Eastern forktail); Ischnura posita (Hagen, 1861) (Fragile forktail); Lestes disjunctus australis * Walker, 1952 (Southern spreadwing) 2 males & 1 female (Figure 2).
- Anisoptera = Celithemis eponina (Drury, 1773), (Halloween pennant); Erythemis simplicollis Say, 1839 (Eastern pondhawk); Sympetrum ambiguum * (Rambur, 1842), (Blue-faced meadowhawk) 2 males (Figure 3); Perithemis tenera (Fabricius, 1798) (amber wing)

* = New Brown County Record.

Species observed, but not collected. Anax junius (Green darner) Pachydiplax longipennis (Blue dasher) Libellula pulchella (Twelve-spotted skimmer) Libellula (Plathemis) lydia (Common whitetail); Of note, we collected a male *Ischnura verticalis* that had the typical divided thoracic stripe markings of *I. posita.* This was the first time we had ever observed this. Have any others observed this in *I. verticalis* ? Dr. George Harp (Arkansas State University) indicated that he had seen this before.

 All collections were made by Steve & Sylvia Chordas.
 All voucher specimens of the above listed species were deposited into the Arkansas State University Museum of Zoology Collection, Jonesboro Arkansas.

VERY EARLY SIGHTING OF BASIAESCHNA JANATA - THE SPRINGTIME DARNER IN OHIO.

Contributions By Andrew Boose & Bob Glotzhober

Andrew Boose observed Basiaeschna janata (Springtime Darner) flying, ovipositing, and mating at Lake Katherine State Nature Preserve (Jackson County) on April 14th. Seems early? Well, it is! Made Andrew wonder if this is going to be a year of early odonata sighting due to this early warm weather.

Bob Glotzhober researched the Ohio database and found the following for the species. Although not a record for Ohio, 14 April is indeed rather early for Basiaeschna janata in Ohio. Our database shows three early dates for the species. R.C. Osburn took a single female in Columbus on 29 April 1899. The next recorded date is a male taken on 18 May 1950 by Paul Harwood in Ashland County. Then on 23 May 2003 Bob Glotzhober took a male at a pond in the Wayne National Forest in Monroe County. Other than those three, all the records are from June and beyond. This has certainly been a very early, warm spring once our snows finally melted. Bob has noticed that in the blooming of wildflowers as well. The question will be whether this pattern continues, or if a cold spell slows it down and stretches the spring out, as often happens with such early springs. This also shows the value of maintaining the database of such records. Too bad a photo was not taken or specimen was not collected.

DRAGONFLIES IN THE CLASSROOM AT OHIO STATE!

The 2010 summer program (OSTEP) at Ohio State for incoming freshmen in the STEM disciplines will include a class entitled "integrated science". The OSTEP program is a rather intense 6 weeks of courses lasting all day - everyday. This aims to introduce the new students to the college level expectations of various courses they should expect to encounter during their first year of college. One of the goals of the integrated science class is to have students actively involved in a research project. They will be expected to take on a research problem, fully investigate that, collect all necessary data, incorporate their findings into a report + presentation that they will be expected to give (seminar style) to the rest of the class.
