Moot Court

This past fall, moot court students in Dr. Tager's POLS 215/315 course worked on the hypothetical case provided by the American Moot Court Association, DeNolf v. Olympus. The case involved warrantless surveillance of an RV that police suspected of involvement in drug trafficking. That surveillance led to the arrest of 15-year-old William DeNolf for beating his ex-girlfriend in the RV. DeNolf was convicted of attempted murder and received a 50-year to life sentence. DeNolf sued Olympus, claiming that warrantless drone surveillance constituted an unreasonable search violating the Fourth Amendment, and that his 50year to life sentence constituted cruel and unusual punishment violating the Eighth Amendment. Based on actual case law, students developed appellate legal arguments for both parties on both issues in the litigation.

This past fall four students in two teams (Kyra Eaton '25, Abby Scott '25, Grace Wharton '24, and Michaela Medich '23) competed at the Midwest Regional Moot Court Tournament at Wooster College in Wooster Ohio on November 11th. Another four students in two teams (Gabe Hehr '23. Jason Panas '23. Jacob Milliron '25. and Jack Wallace '24) competed at the Eastern Michigan Regional Moot Court Tournament at Eastern Michigan University in Ypsilanti Michigan on November 19th. Each tournament attracted a strong field of teams from prominent colleges and universities. The Midwest Regional was won by a team from the University of Chicago, and the Eastern Michigan Regional was won by a team from Duke University.

Notable Student Activities

Natalie Johnson '22 was interviewed on WTAP-TV in early November for her views on Ohio Issue One, a constitutional amendment about bail on the November ballot for ratification by the public. She was working part-time for the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) last semester focusing on the issues of criminal justice reform and reproductive rights. In the WTAP-TV interview she explained that the ACLU opposed Issue One since it basically "constitutionalizes cash bail," which she said represents "a wealth-based system of detention." Washington County Prosecutor Nicole Coil explained her support for Issue One in this same news segment.

Cole Longcor '22 and Andrew Novak '22 were inducted into Pi Sigma Alpha, the national Political Science honor society. Michaela Donnelly '24, Andrew Novak '22, and Elizabeth Stern '23 were inducted into Omicron Delta Kappa, the national Leadership honor society. The event was held at the DBRC, and speakers included Ohio Senate candidate JD Vance and U.S. Senator Ted Cruz. The dinner raised funds for local Republican candidates.

Carlson Experiential Education Endowment Award and used it to attend the International Leadership Association's 2022 Global Conference in Washington, DC, last October with a group led by Dr. Alexandra Perry, Dean of the McDonough Leadership Program. Model United Nations

Seven students and Dr. Morgan attended the Lake Erie International Model United Nations conference November 10-12, 2022. The conference was held at the Sawmill Creek Resort in Huron, Ohio, and consisted of three simulated committees. The Security Council had an open agenda, the Human Rights Council considered the situation in Afghanistan, involuntary disappearances, and rights related to recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic, while the North Atlantic Treaty Organization addressed relations with Ukraine, cyber-defense, and security/peace issues related to women.
