Loan Approval and Conditionality: Is There an “I” in IMF?”; and **Bryan Murray**, “Do Small States Balance in the Same Manner as Large States?” In addition, **CJ Englert**, **Jessica Johnson**, **Zach Eddy**, and **Josh Counselman** reprised their Moot Court arguments under the direction and questioning

Jessica Johnson won the Jewett Prize for her speech

at graduation titled “How Do You Measure Your Time at Marietta College?” She also won the Delta Upsilon Good Citizenship Award, given by the Faculty Council to the graduating senior who best embodies the traits of scholarship, leadership, character, and participation in extra-curricular activities.

Internships

Last Spring **Zach Eddy** interned at the Marietta City Law Office, **Chanell Cornett** interned at the Marietta Municipal Court, and **Eric Miranda** interned at the Office of the National Ombudsman of the Small Business Administration in Washington DC.

This past summer **Bryan Murray** and **Taylor Myers** interned on the Jennifer Garrison for Congress Campaign in Marietta, **Ed Harvey** interned at Mesir-ow Financial in Chicago, **Danie Chirdon** interned at the Marietta Municipal Court, and **Kurt Fire** interned at the Akron Metropolitan Housing Authority.

Over the summer **Chanell Cornett** interned with the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation (CBCF) in

Washington DC in the office of Congresswoman Marcia L. Fudge, Ohio 11th district. She writes that she “assisted staff with research, including writing a report on gun violence in Cleveland, and researching Ohio heroin statistics used in a House bill introduced by Congresswoman Fudge, as well as drafted letters to constituents, attended briefings and hearings, including one by Attorney General Eric Holder on mandatory minimum sentences, and led Capitol tours for constituents. With the CBCF part of my internship, I attended several lectures from Congressional Black Caucus mem-



bers, graduate schools, and federal agencies in Washington DC. In my two month internship I enhanced my knowledge on politics, gained meaningful relationships and knowledge on working in an office setting, and this was one of the best experiences I've had in college thus far.”

Over the summer **Michael Fahy** interned with the State Department at the US Consulate General in Chengdu, China. He writes that “my main posting was within the Consulate's Regional



Security Office, though I also volunteered with other sections, helping Foreign Service officers with public outreach events, visa application processing, and political report research and writing. [I] ... assisted the regional security officer and his assistant with efforts to repatriate convicted American felons, visa fraud investigations, and regular security report writing for the Consulate's various public and political events. Additionally, I led the chartering process for the Chengdu chapter of the US DoS's private-public security cooperative, the Overseas Security Advisory Council. My experience was an invaluable introduction to government employment and to a life in the US Foreign Service.”

Study Abroad

Alina Kielbasa studied at the University of the South Pacific-Fiji and in Tuvalu last spring.

Danie Chirdon studied at Helsinki University last spring. She writes that “I lived in the heart of downtown where I was able to experience big city life. I chose Finland because my family is from there



and I was able to meet family I had only seen on Facebook, some didn't speak English! My favorite class was War and War Crimes focusing on international tribunals. I also took a language class, Finnish history classes and EU economics classes. Politically speaking it was a very interesting time to be in Finland with their history with Russia. Events in Ukraine had a big impact on Finnish politics. The best aspects of studying abroad were making

friends from all over the world, having my mother come visit me and finding my grandmother's house.”

On his trip to China this past summer as a delegate to the 2014 US-China Student Summit, **Kurt Fire** travelled in Beijing and Shanghai, and got to meet personally with the US Ambassador to China, Max Baucus. Aside from visits to landmarks like the Temple of Heaven, the Forbidden

City, and the Great Wall, he had interesting encounters with the Beijing subway system, roast duck neck on a stick, and a Yuan Wang-class missile tracking ship.
