- Marietta College received two grants to help provide monetary incentives for employers and students who participate in internships.


EVANS ENDOWED INTERNSHIP PROGRAM 2017:

Amanda Rogers is the recipient of The 2017 Robert Evans Internship Endowment. Amanda, a double major in Economics and Management, spent the summer in Cleveland interning with Insight2Profit, a fast-growing price consulting and technology firm serving domestic and international B2B manufacturers, distributors and service providers. The Robert Evans Internship Endowment was set up by an alumnus several years ago and awards \$5,000 to one qualified student who participates in a summer internship at a for-profit organization, specifically a major national or global organization. The \$5,000 can be used for relocation, travel, housing, meals, related equipment purchases and other living expenses.

For Cameron Dowiak, having the opportunity to spend the summer working in a lab at Yale University was the culmination of her own impressive scientific



background and a helpful alumni connection. It was Brendan Adkinson '16 who reached out to Dr. Kevin Pate, McCoy Professor of Chemistry, to see if there were any current Marietta students who would be a good fit to intern in the lab he works in at Yale. That lab, overseen by Dr. Alan Anticevic, is part of the Clinical Neuroscience Research Unit in Yale's Department of Psychiatry.

Though her background working with children who have mental disabilities and autism was preferred since the intern-assisted study dealt with autism, Cameron still had to go through all of the traditional steps of applying for an internship

When Cameron reflects on her Marietta experiences, she is impressed by "the access to teachers and the one-on-one guidance. Everyone here goes above and beyond."

Jason chose Marietta College because of the strong faculty relationships offered. "Dr. Pate in the Chemistry Department

expressed how strong this connection was between students and faculty and that convinced me that this was the best place for me."

He is studying the effects of anesthetic on human lung cells. He became interested in this topic during a job shadowing experience with an anesthesiologist. Jason hopes to attend medical school or an M.D./Ph.D. program and is open to many different areas of specialty.

CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

- 250 students participated in volunteer service, which is approximately 25% of the student body. Please note: this number does NOT include athletic team or Greek Life volunteer activities.
- 2720 total hours of community service were donated by students in programs offered through the Office of Civic Engagement.
- · Partnerships with over 47 local community partners in the Mid-Ohio Valley, including Parkersburg, Belpre, Williamstown and Marietta, occurred in 2016-17.

The Office of Civic Engagement, in partnership with Marietta College's Office of Student Life, traveled to Washington, D.C., from March 11-16, 2017 with nine students for a week of experiential education, service learning and reflection in the nation's capital as part of the Alternative Break program. In addition to hands-on service projects, each Alternative Break trip includes educational components such as visits to museums, meetings with local community members, films and speakers. During the experience, students also commit to fully engaging with a group of their peers through activities such as shared preparation of meals, chores and care of community living space, collective planning of free time activities, and group discussions about their experiences. The theme of the 2017 spring trip was marginalized communities. Partnering with the William Penn House in Washington, D.C., students participated in several service-learning projects during the week. The group took a walking tour of the Shaw neighborhood with ONE DC, an advocacy organization working to balance economic development with the rights of longtime residents. They also packed wound care kits to be distributed to homeless populations through health outreach programs, met with volunteers who provide weekly free meals in the city's parks, learned about the lobbying process and participated in a student lobbying training, and planted vegetables in an urban farm with DC UrbanGreens. The group also had a chance to tour the U.S. Capitol and spend an afternoon at the recently opened Smithsonian National Museum of African American History. Other highlights of the trip included a visit to the National Archives and an evening tour of monuments.

CLASS OF 2017 BIOCHEMISTRY MAJORS & VETERINARY SCHOOL

Growing up on a farm in the western part of Washington County, Ashley Payne '17 (Watertown, Ohio) has been caring for animals almost her entire life.

On a particular day when she was in junior high school, she noticed one of the family pigs was sick. From that moment there was never a doubt of her career path.

"I wanted to be a veterinarian," she said.

Payne is not alone. She's one of three Marietta College Biochemistry students who have been accepted into a vet school for the fall. Payne will attend Purdue University, while Rachel Stahl '17 (Oley, Pennsylvania) is going to The Ohio State University and Megan Bache '17 (Westland, Michigan) will attend the University of Missouri.

With just 30 veterinary schools in the U.S., it can be challenging to get into a program — especially on a first attempt. However, all three students believe their experiences at Marietta played in a role in helping them gain admission.

Stahl said she feels more than prepared to take on the challenges she'll face at Ohio State in the fall.

"Our classes are rigorous," she said. "The professors aren't pushing you through, they are pushing you in it. It's not a graduate course load, but there are definitely graduate expectations. Professors at Marietta want you to thrive in your major. I remember when I got a lab paper back and I got a 7 out of 10. The professor stopped me after class and said, 'I hope I never see this from you again.' It wasn't mean-spirited. It was meant to establish expectations and prepare me for the future."

Bache also had an opportunity to assist in Biology and Biochemistry classes at Marietta — something she said impressed the faculty at both







Missouri and Michigan State during her interview.

"I talked about being a TA and how I had presented research at the American Chemical Society meeting," Bache said. "They asked me about my research, but also my work in the McDonough Leadership program. This is what you are able to do at Marietta that you can't do at other places."

Bache and Stahl are planning to present their undergraduate research at the National American Chemical Society Meeting in San Francisco in April. All three students have developed a friendship and they compared notes as they applied and interviewed at schools.

Dr. Parsons, who has been known to hold some of those special study sessions, has enjoyed having all three students in her classes over the past four years.

"I feel that they have acquired skills such as critical thinking, problem solving and scientific research analysis — to name a few — through active learning and inquiry based experiments," Parsons said. "These skills should serve them well as they progress in their education and career. I am proud to have them as students and know that they will do well in vet school and beyond."
