## Formal vs Informal

How do I know if my paper should be formal or informal?

Types of Informal Writing: reflections, personal opinion, journal, professor says it is informal Types of Formal Writing: research paper, reports, proposals, critiques, essays, articles, critical thinking essay, MOST COMMON in college papers

## FORMAL WRITING:

- ✓ Do not use contractions
  - > "can't, shouldn't, they're" instead use "cannot, should not, they are"
- ✓ Do not use first person language, use third person instead
  - "I feel like the author wants to make us happy."
  - > "The author uses a writing technique to promote a happy feeling in her audience."
- ✓ Do not use colloquialisms/writing as if you were speaking (see colloquialism chart)
- ✓ Focus on vocabulary
  - > Use thesaurus!
  - Avoid broad words "things, stuff, nice, cool"
- ✓ Write in the style your professor indicates on the assignment (APA, MLA, Chicago, etc)
- ✓ Use complex sentences as much as possible
  - Avoid short or choppy sentences

Common Colloquialisms & Replacements

Kind of  $\rightarrow$  similar to; rather

Loads/tons/a whole bunch/a lot  $\rightarrow$  very many; numerous

A couple → a few; a small number

Sank in → registered; understood

No clue → oblivious; ignorant

Start off  $\rightarrow$  to begin

Not really all that bad → manageable; endurable; tolerable

Deal with → encounter; resolve

Kind of thing  $\rightarrow$  a similar item/idea

Right off the bat  $\rightarrow$  immediately

Get to  $\rightarrow$  have the opportunity to

Way more → much more

Come/coming up with → think of

Spot on  $\rightarrow$  accurate; exact

Some sort of  $\rightarrow$  a form of

Looked into → researched
