Political Science Capstone

The individual capstone research projects included **Dan Fox's** on negative campaigns, **Anthony Jones'** on the impact of race on jury sentencing recommendations, **Kenzi McAffee's** on recidivism in rural areas, and **Latrice Nelson's** on fake news and media literacy. All the research projects were directed by Dr. Schaefer, with some assistance from Dr. Morgan.

This past fall ten students in POLS 215/315 Moot Court (Cameron Cantley, Bri Dietry, Dan Fox, Katie Kitchen, Kenzi McAfee, Nick Mitchell, Katie Perkins, Chris Stephens, Max Turner, and Emily Vigue) worked on the hypothetical case provided by the American Moot Court Association Somerville v. Olympus State University, which involved both the free speech rights of government employees and a 14th Amendment challenge to affirmative action. Seven students competed in an Invitational Tournament at Ohio Wesleyan University in October, and eight students competed at the Midwest Regional Tournament at the College of Wooster in November. The team of Katie Kitchen and Nick Mitchell made it into the second round, where they faced a team from the University of Chicago that ultimately won the tournament. 
